MULCHING

Spreading mulch around your trees does more than keep your trees looking great. Mulch discourages weeds from growing, preserves up to 25% more soil moisture, keeps soil temperatures cooler in summer and warmer in winter, protects trees from lawn mower damage, and organic mulches can add much-needed nutrients to our sandy soil.

Good Mulching

- Spread mulch ring at least 3 feet around the tree, preferably all the way out to the drip line (the outer edge of the tree's canopy.)
- Keep mulch several inches away from the base of the tree to avoid rot and disease.
- If grass is growing around your tree, put a 5-page layer of newspaper over the grass, get it wet, then add mulch on top.
- Spread mulch in a loose layer 2-4 inches deep to allow water and air to reach the tree roots.



Bad Mulching

- A common bad mulching practice is to pile thick mulch around the base of a tree.
 - These are called **mulch volcanoes** and are very harmful to your tree. Mulch volcanoes can trap moisture around a tree trunk leading to decay and eventually killing the tree.
- Don't use fine mulch. Thick blankets of fine mulch can become matted and prevent the penetration of air and water to your tree.



 Avoid adding excessive layers of mulch every year. Instead, break up the old mulch with a rake and add a new layer on top if the mulch bed is less than 4 inches deep.
